Mission, Vision and Virtues relaunched at Feast Day celebrations

Almost 1,000 members of staff from our 25 schools and Central Team gathered for our Trust Feast Day celebrations, where CEO, Kevin Gritton, launched our new Mission, Vision and Virtues. We also heard from inspirational keynote speaker Sister Judith Russi and celebrated Mass with Father Simon Gillespie. Our new **Mission** was created at our Trust Pupil Parliament, with input from staff and students from all 25 schools in the Trust. It is: 'Growing in faith, serving with love, transforming our world; together in Christ'.

Our **Vision** is that we will:

- Provide Catholic formation which inspires all of us to live a life of service modelled on the Gospels.

St Edward's celebrates launch of

new science lab

A primary school teacher's dream of creating a science laboratory for her pupils has come true.

Nashim Prabatani has always wanted to provide pupils at St Edward's Catholic Voluntary Academy, in Swadlincote, with a space dedicated to science to enhance their learning.

Her vision has finally become a reality as the school has opened its own 'Phiz Lab', with help from local businesses and the Ogden Trust, which works with schools to promote physics.

The school received £2,500 from the Ogden Trust, support from electronics company Integrex and logistics company Clipper as well as Acorn Home and Garden Services, all based in Swadlincote.



Together, they transformed an under utilised area of school into a 'Phiz Lab', complete with an area for children to carry out their investigations using dedicated science equipment.



Pupils go back in time for 50th anniversary celebrations

Classroom slippers, the dreaded 'black seat' and building igloos on snow days were just some of the memories shared during 50th anniversary celebrations at St Anne's Catholic Voluntary Academy. Families, staff and pupils came together to commemorate 50 years of the school being at its current Lightwood Road site in Buxton. Long serving members of staff talked about their time at St Anne's and there were video contributions from ex-pupils at the event, which was led by Headteacher Julia Wiggins and organised by Assistant Headteacher Frankie Dodd.

'Good' Ofsted inspections for two Trust schools

St Charles' and St Joseph's in Derby were inspected.

Two Trust schools are celebrating 'Good' ratings following Ofsted inspections.

A full inspection was carried out at St Charles', in Glossop, which was judged to be 'Good' in all areas.

An ungraded inspection took place at St Joseph's, in Derby, and the inspector said that it continued to be a 'Good' school.

Inspectors at St Charles' said that staff did their utmost to ensure that pupils 'Belong, Believe and Blossom.' They said: "This ethos and vision shine through many aspects of school life. Pupils say they are happy and safe. "One pupil said: 'It is a pleasure to be here. I am proud to be part of this school.'"

Praise was given to staff who "have high expectations for pupils", according to the report, which also said that pupils worked hard and were enthusiastic learners who contributed well to lessons.

"They (pupils) behave well and are polite to each other, staff and to visitors," inspectors said.

The report noted that staff provided a wide range of popular activities that helped to stretch pupils' talents and interests.

"This ethos and vision shine through many aspects of school life. Pupils say they are happy and safe."

The lead inspector at St Joseph's said the school was a a happy, safe place where staff and pupils treated each other with respect.

The report noted that pupils worked hard, were kind to each other and were proud ambassadors of the school's values.

Pupils told the inspector that the school was 'like a whole entire family under one roof'.

"All staff have high expectations for all pupils. Pupils are supported well to meet these expectations. They are keen



to do their best," the inspector's report said.

The wide range of opportunities that the school offers were noted in the report, including Irish dancing, Gaelic football and residential trips. School leaders were praised for a well structured curriculum that reflects the diverse

population of the school

community with reading described as "fundamental to the school's curriculum."

The inspector said: "Each topic is enriched with books from a variety of interesting authors and genres. Pupils love talking to visiting authors. They are inspired to become readers and writers."

Children in Reception class learn the routines and behaviours that enable them to be successful in school, according to the report.

Noah Gash scooped the Inspirational Young Person Award at the Derby Youth Awards run by Derby City Council.

The Award recognises a young person who has overcome a great barrier, or has shown great courage, becoming an inspirational role model to other young people within their community, or the city. Noah was seriously ill from birth and spent a significant amount of time in hospital, where he was told he wouldn't be able to walk or talk.

Now he attends mainstream school at Saint Benedict, is a sports leader and has completed his Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award. Due to his passion for the environment, he also volunteers on local litter picks.

12 Days of Kindness Challenge launched across the Trust

Schools across the Trust have been invited to take part in a 12 days of kindness challenge in December. Trust Performing Arts Lead, Anna West, is co-ordinating the initiative and has asked schools to consider sharing simple activities and reflections with pupils and staff.
